Welcome to Stoke Radio Controlled Model Car Club,
This guide is to provide a brief explanation of what happens in a club meeting
to help you enjoy your nights racing and also to explain
what needs to be done to help
others enjoy theirs.

Racing

A nights racing consists of 4 races of 5 minutes duration with the first two races started with a staggered delay so that each competitor is effectively racing against the clock with the aim of getting a qualifying position for the final two races which are run with a formula 1 style grid start.

Marshalling

Unfortunately everybody crashes and for the next group of racers after your own turn you will be expected to act as a race marshal to help right any crashed cars. Marshal from the numbers positioned all around the track corresponding to your racing number allocated before racing starts always remembering to be careful of the cars still running.

League

At the end of the nights racing everyone's fastest race of the night is sorted to award points towards the Stoke club League which is on display each week and can also be viewed on the club website. The League runs for 12 weeks with the best 9 weeks results counting with an end of league Finals meeting.

Safety

RC cars can be quite fast and so are not without danger even though it is rare for anyone to get more than a bruise it is important for everyone to be careful at all times. In today's claim culture our club has to be a member of the British Radio Car Association or BRCA for short for insurance cover. All regular racers must be individual members for insurance purposes also. Any non BRCA members will not be allowed on the track at any time but are welcome to watch from the sidelines at their own risk.

New members

Anyone with their own RC car is welcome to try 3 weeks racing under club insurance before being required to join. As buying an RC car costs money it is also possible to request to borrow a car provided by the club to try the sport. Any request to do this must be done in person the week before. Please be aware any cars supplied are kindly volunteered by senior members and may be slightly limited in performance to make them easier to drive and prevent breakages.

Other information

Please be aware that Stoke RCMCC is a non-profit organization and all committee members are helping to run the club on a free voluntary basis elected by senior members. All money goes to paying for facilities and equipment without exception. The equipment used during the evenings racing does not set up and pack itself away and we would kindly ask that all members please help wherever possible to help set up and pack away the track with most help needed in unloading and reloading the hosepipe track markings from the moveable rostrums.
